



Weave a Real Peace 2018 Annual Meeting Sustaining Culture: Environment, Economy, Community

WARP's 2018 Annual Meeting is set for June 7th – 10th in Decorah, Iowa and features talks each morning, tours each afternoon and evening programs. *We welcome new members to join us for the annual meeting* [Join here](#).

Meeting Registration Costs: The Member Registration cost is \$225, and for Non-members is \$275, which includes a one-year WARP membership. There is also a special one-day rate of \$95, you can pick the day. Join first above, or click here to [Register](#).

Lodging and Meals: You will submit your Housing Request directly to Luther College, but only after your meeting registration is confirmed. Your confirmation email will include the link to the Luther College Housing Request Form. Costs are below, please be aware that you are expected to pay for your housing upon your arrival at Luther College.

- Double Room costs: \$40.50 per person per night
- Single Room costs: \$47.25 per person per night
- Meals costs: You will order and pay for your Meal Package ahead, using either PayPal or by sending a check to WARP. The Meal Package is \$95, and includes Dinner on Thursday June 7, Breakfast, Lunch, and Dinner on Friday and Saturday, and Breakfast / Brunch on Sunday June 10. There will also be coffee, tea, and refreshments available, as well as a cash bar for wine and beer in the evenings. Saturday evening includes our Birthday Cake!
- Approximate Total for Housing and Meals: With a double room for 3 days, plus the Meal Package, your costs will be approximately \$220.00.

Getting to Decorah:

Decorah, IA is located in the northeast corner of Iowa, near the border with Minnesota and Wisconsin. It is located on IA State Route 9, near the junction with ISR-52.

Flying: Three airports serve the area: Waterloo, IA (77 miles from Decorah); LaCrosse, WI (56 miles from Decorah), and Rochester, MN (71 miles from Decorah).

By Car: Decorah is a three-hour drive (145 miles) from Madison, WI and (158 miles) from Minneapolis. It is a 5-hour drive (287 miles) from Chicago - and each of these cities also have airports served by more than one airline.
